

# Free Concerts Coming to Centralia

Two free concerts will be held in Centralia at the beginning of December.

The first concert, the Lewis County Community band, will feature instrumental music at Corbet Theatre on Dec. 2 at 7:30 p.m. The band is an ensemble of brass, woodwinds and percussion instruments and is co-directed by Louie Blaser and Karl Scarborough.
